Description: This course covers the behavior of economic decision-making units, such consumers, firms and resource owners, as they interact through market exchanges in perfect and imperfect markets.

The efficient way to study for this course is with a sharpened pencil and scratch paper. Begin by mastering definitions. Then, sketch each graph and write short notes on the concepts and relationships covered in lectures and in the textbook. This should be done routinely as the intuition, insights and analytical skills involved in economic reasoning are acquired by calculating solutions to economic problems, and in geometrically portraying their qualitative and quantitative properties.

Homework: will be given routinely and should be handed in no later than the beginning of class on the due date. Late homework will not be accepted. Graphs must be neat, accurate and completely labeled.

Grading: Your grade will be determined by your scores on the following:
