Course Content: Basic macroeconomic concepts, theories of economic growth and business cycles, and government monetary and fiscal policy.

Course Requirements: Three homework sets and three exams.

Grading: The homework sets are worth 150 points, (50 points each), and the exams 450 points, (150 points each), totaling 600 points in all.

Homework sets should be typed or neatly written. Homework should be handed in no later than the beginning of class on the due date. Late homework sets will not be accepted.

No make-up exams will be given. Under unusual and well-documented circumstances, a single missed midterm exam will simply result in a re-weighting of points on the other two exams. However, ordinarily a missed exam will result in a substantial penalty. If both midterm exams are missed, or if the final exam is missed, then a grade of "T" will be assigned, to be removed only after the student completes all of the graded work in a section of 4353/7353 in a later semester.
