Course Overview and Objectives:

Money and banking is an exciting discipline that covers issues of importance in real life. This course provides an overview of the working of the financial and economic system and seeks to provide an understanding of how a financial economy operates. This is a broader objective. Specifically, after finishing the course you will be able to:

- Understand and compare different financial instruments in terms of return, risk and liquidity.
- Derive the price or the interest rate of different debt instruments and analyze how the different interest rates are related.
- Understand how the commercial banks operate and type of risks they face.
- Understand the roots and causes of the Global Financial Crisis of 2007-2009 and its effect on the US economy as well as laws and regulations.
- Use different exchange rates to make cross-country comparisons and identify factors that affect exchange rates.

Textbook

Cecchetti, *Money, Banking and Financial Markets*, 5th edition, (McGraw Hill, 2017). Having this textbook is required and absolutely essential.

Grades

Plus/Minus grades will be determined on the basis of two midterm examinations, a cumulative final examination, quizzes, group homework and discussion board postings. A maximum of 530 points can be earned in the course. Point values are shown below:

The letter grade (plus/minus) is assigned based on the total points you can earn:

A+ 97% (514.1 points) or more

A 93% (492.9 points) or more to strictly less than 97% (514.1 points)

And similarly for other letter grades.

Lectures and Labs

There won't be in-person meeting this semester. Video lectures (asynchronous, can be watched anytime) will be available on Canvas in addition to other practice materials and content. Similarly, there won't be discussion lab meetings this semester. This decision was made to protect health of students, TAs and instructors, and also, it's least disruptive in case Mizzou campus pivots to online format midsemester.

Quizzes

A total of 13 online quizzes will be given. Quizzes will be offered on Canvas every week other than exam weeks. Quizzes will become available on Monday mornings and be due Thursdays 9:00 PM. They will consist of 10 multiple choice questions and be timed to 25 minutes. Once started, quiz cannot be saved and must be completed. *Extremely important:* while taking a quiz do not open any other windows, do not hit back button, etc. If you get disconnected for any reason, the system will not let you back in. That's why you should choose a reliable computer with a reliable connection. Quizzes will be based on material already covered in online lectures that week. Only the highest 10 quiz scores will count which means you can drop the 3 lowest.

Group Homework

At the beginning of the semester, the entire class will be broken up into groups of 4 students or less. Canvas will do the random assignment of students to groups. Almost every week there will be homework assigned to each group and group members are expected to download the

homework, communicate and collaborate with group members, and upload the finished, single, homework. After the homework is graded, everyone in the group will be assigned the same score. Total 12 homework will be assigned but only the highest 10 will count, meaning you can drop two lowest scores. Homework will be assigned on Monday mornings on Canvas and always be due on Fridays 9:00 PM. Canvas offers variety of tools to help you to communicate and collaborate with your group members. Note: group members that are consistently absent from groupwork and do not communicate with group members will be penalized by taking away part or all of his/her homework score.

Discussion Board

Almost every week I will assign articles from Wall Street Journal that you will need to read and post your thoughts in the discussion board. You don't need a subscription to WSJ as I will provide those articles. Questions based on these articles will also show on exams. Discussion board posts will be available on Monday mornings and always due on Fridays 9:00 PM. Unlike homework, discussion board postings should be an **individual** effort and we will monitor the discussion board for plagiarism. Below is the rubric used to evaluate your replies. A total of 12 discussion board threads will be assigned, but only the highest 10 will count, meaning you can drop two lowest.

Late or Missed Work

Make up work generally is not available. But we do give you significant flexibility with assignments. With quizzes, you can drop 3 lowest scores. With homework and discussions, you can drop 2 lowest scores. In addition, even though each assignment has a clear due date, Canvas will allow to submit an assignment (quiz, exam, homework, or discussion) late but with significant penalty. Exams are offered over two-day interval (please make sure to check schedule on Canvas) which allows you to plan accordingly. It's strongly recommended to start the assignments well before the due date just to allow enough room for technical glitches. Also, the system sometimes slows down close to the due date when everyone is trying to submit an assignment.

Exams

Exams will be offered on Canvas over two-day interval. You can start the exam anytime during this window, but once started, it's timed (60 minutes for midterms and 90 minutes for the final exam). I do not require any kind of special browser lockdown. Exams are open books and notes. However, they must reflect your individual effort and no one else. In general, for assignments that are timed, such as quizzes and exams, it's strongly recommended to start them in a quite environment with reliable internet connection. If you have accommodations

from the disability center, please e-mail me before timed assignments (quizzes and exams) so that I can manually adjust allowed time.

Help and Office Hours

You are encouraged to visit mine and TA Zoom office hours (see Canvas). I have an excellent group of 5 graduate teaching assistants who will be grading your homework and discussion board postings. Please take into consideration that the material we cover is cumulative in nature and once you start falling behind it will be progressively more difficult to catch up. I think it will be great if you can check with us at least once a week just to stay on top of homework, discussions and other assignments. We are happy to help!
