Course Catalog Description:

Theory of rational behavior in consumption, production, and pricing decisions of households and firms. Topics include the economics of the firm in the context of partial equilibria in product and factor markets under competition, monopoly, oligopoly and monopolistic competition as well as game theory. No credit for students who have completed ECONOM 4351.

Course Objectives

This course provides a grounding in microeconomic theory to help you make decisions as a manager. We will be combining microeconomic theory in order to understand how and why individuals and firms make their decisions. Topics covered include consumer theory, the theory of the firm, bargaining and market power, pricing strategies, insurance markets and the economics of information.

At the end of the course, I hope that

- (1) You are able to utilize economic theory to make more informed strategic decisions
- (2) You further develop technical skills and intuition used in microeconomic analysis
- (3) You discover areas of study that interest you and provide a basis for future paths

At the end of the course, I hope that

- (1) You are able to engage in informed discussions about human behavior and it's impact on the business environment.
- (2) You further develop your technical skills and intuition used in decision making analysis
- (3) You discover areas of study that interest you and provide a basis for future paths

Prerequisites

We will utilize technical skills throughout this course. As such, it's strongly advised that you have both algebra and calculus to derive solutions to systems of equations. Although we will review the necessary math, both are strongly recommended.

Additionally, this class is about translating language and observed actions into mathematical sentences. Expect to spend time honing your skills. Any effort you spend here will benefit you both in this class and future endeavours.

Recommended Weekly Pace

This class is designed with a specific pace (or "workflow") in mind. Below is the sample workflow:

- 1. Monday-Wednesday: Work through lecture materials
 - a. Read the book chapters by using the link in the "to do" list to read each book chapter
 - b. Read the content pages and watch the lecture videos, and
 - c. Complete the LearnSmart activity
- 2. Thursday-Friday: Work on Homework, study for bi-weekly guiz
 - a. Complete the weekly homework and hand it in
 - b. Study for the bi-weekly quiz
- 3. Saturday-Sunday: Take the bi-weekly quiz (if assigned) and wrap up any lingering work
 - a. Take the bi-weekly quiz (at the end of Week 1, 3, 5, and 7)
 - b. Wrap up any lingering work you didn't get to earlier in the week

You are free to adjust this schedule to fit your needs -- whether that is working solely on the weekends or working only during the work week, etc. If you finish work for the week early, get a jump on the next week. You are always able to work ahead, but do not fall behind. This class is a 3 credit hour, 8 week course. Anticipate spending 9-12 hours a week on class content (for 15 week courses, the general rule of thumb is 3 hours outside class time for every 1 hour in class. Given that the course is only 8 weeks, anticipate doubling that workload).

Course Policies and Procedures

Lecture Attendance: You are expected to watch all recorded lectures.

LearnSmart: You are expected to complete all LearnSmart activities by the due date. LearnSmart is an adaptive learning software that helps you master the chapter concepts and prepare for the bi-weekly quizzes. There 12 assigned LearnSmart's this semester (Chapter 3-Chapter 14). They are graded on a complete/incomplete basis and you can drop 2 of them.

Homework: The class includes 7 homework assignments. Your top 6 scores will count. This means that you will drop your lowest homework grade (whether it is a low score or a homework you did not submit). No late homeworks will be accepted. No exemptions or extensions will be granted for weekly homework.

Homework Due Dates: Homework is on Sunday to Canvas by 11:59pm.

Bi-Weekly Quizzes: This course consists of four bi-weekly quizzes. Your 3 highest quiz scores will count towards your final grade. You may use notes, book, and other resources on the quizzes, but are not permitted to discuss the contents of the quizzes with your coursemates. Any discussion will be treated as an instance of academic dishonesty and reported to the University.
