- **Course Description**: This course will provide an introduction to economic dynamics. Topics include continuous and discrete dynamic systems, optimal control theory, dynamic programming in discrete time variables, and applications to various economic problems. Such concepts as the Maximum Principle and the Bellman Equation will be learnt.
