LECTURES:

HOMEWORK & EXAMS:

There will be homework almost every week. The homework will reinforce concepts discussed in the text or lecture. Hence, they will prepare you for the main exam. Homework is always due at the beginning of class.

There are total of two midterm exams. Midterm exams will be given during class time, and you must take these exams at the scheduled times. Most of the exam questions will be similar to homework questions, and/or they will be from lecture and reading assignments.

Tests will only be administered during scheduled times and homework will be collected on the due date on time. An unexcused failure to take tests at the scheduled time will result in receiving a "zero" and late homework will be scored as zeros.
