Online Econ 8370 – Mathematics for Economics Fall 2022 Department of Economics University of Missouri-Columbia

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(Note: All times used in this syllabus are US Central Time (CT). Daylight saving time in 2022 will end at 2:00am on Sunday, November 6.)

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The aim of this course is to cover essential mathematics used in economics. Topics include introductory linear algebra, single- and multi-variable functions, multivariate calculus, comparative statics analysis, matrix algebra, equilibrium analyses, unconstrained optimization, equality constrained optimization, and their applications in economics. May be repeated for credit. Graded on A-F basis only. Prerequisites: ECONOM 4351 or equivalent; MATH 1320 or equivalent.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

After completing the entire course, you are expected to be able to

- Understand fundamental concepts of single- and multi-variable functions
- Understand basic concepts of matrix algebra
- Understand basic concepts of unconstrained and constrained optimization
- Apply basic mathematical concepts to analyze some important economic problems

- There is a test for each of three segments of the course. Each segment test will be on Thursday night in the segment review week. Each test will start at 7pm CT and end at 9pm CT (15 minutes for setting up; 90 minutes for answering questions; and 15 minutes for submission.)
- All assignments and tests must be submitted in Canvas by the deadline in one file (Please read the Instruction on File Submission file in the Course Info module). Please note that once the due time has reached, the link to submit disappears and you can no longer submit your answers.

MISSED TEST POLICY

You are expected to take all tests. But if you have an extraordinary circumstance that affects your ability to take a test, please contact the instructor as early as possible for an alternative arrangement.

SHOW YOUR INDEPENDENT WORK

All tests in this class will be open book and unsupervised. However, it is very important that all of your submitted answers are your own independent work. You are not allowed to consult anyone else.

The course will be graded on the basis of six homework assignments and three tests. All assignments together will be worth 10 percent of your final grade. Each test will be worth 30 percent of your final grade. Letter grades will be assigned using the Grade Table below.

Advice (How to be Successful)

- Keep up on a regular schedule.
- Read the textbook/study the chapter slides: For each chapter covered, the first thing I recommend is to read both the chapter lecture slides in Canvas and the textbook.
- Watch the lecture videos. Each week has two or three lecture videos. These are recorded videos using voiceovers of lecture slides. I encourage you to view the videos at least once. However, each of you will develop a study method most suitable to you and some of you may find that studying the chapter slides is more effective.

• Practice, practice, practice! For each chapter covered, problems from the textbook will be selected as Work Problems. You are strongly encouraged to work on these problems as practice problems and then check the answer keys.

ACADEMIC INQUIRY, COURSE DISCUSSION, AND PRIVACY

When students record something that happens in a course (a lecture, class discussions, meetings, etc.) it has an impact on the rights of the people captured in that recording. FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 is a federal law designed to protect the privacy of educational records; to establish the rights of students to inspect and review their education records; and to provide guidelines for the correction of inaccurate and misleading data through informal and formal hearings. The law applies to any individual who is or has been in attendance at an institution and regarding whom the institution maintains educational records. Once students have matriculated to the University of Missouri, i.e. enrolled in course work, FERPA rights transfer to the student, regardless of the student's age.

Students can enable certain individuals to have access to their education records by signing a FERPA waiver. The consent must specify records to be disclosed, state the purpose of the disclosure and identify the party or class of parties to whom the disclosure must be made.

NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY
