ECONOMICS 1015H: PRINCIPLES OF MACROECONOMICS (HONORS)

The course will develop your ability to analyze, interpret and explain the macroeconomy. This includes understanding macroeconomic data and building models to interpret that data. Important aims of the course include learning how to express the results of your analysis and interpretation of macroeconomic issues concisely both verbally and in written form. You will be expected to demonstrate an ability to analyze the economy using these written forms, as well as verbally during class discussions.

Econ 1015H provides much greater breadth and depth of coverage than the large Econ 1015 class; it is an ideal course for students who want a more challenging and rewarding introduction to economics.

Homework Assignments

The law applies to any individual who is or has been in attendance at an institution and regarding whom the institution maintains educational records. Once students have matriculated to the University of Missouri, i.e. enrolled in course work, FERPA rights transfer to the student, regardless of the student's age.

Students can enable certain individuals to have access to their education records by signing a <u>FERPA</u> <u>waiver</u>. The consent must specify records to be disclosed, state the purpose of the disclosure and identify the party or class of parties to whom the disclosure must be made.

Nondiscrimination Policy
