Course Catalog Description:

An introduction to the study of how macroeconomic forces and public policy affect the welfare of a nation. Topics include understanding the business cycle, economic growth, inflation, interest rates, and unemployment, as well as the effects of fiscal and monetary policy.

Why Economics?

Economics is everywhere. The terms may be new, but you have been dealing with economic factors your whole life. In Macroeconomics, we will take a wider, global look. Big topics you hear in the news like inflation, unemployment, GDP, and their relationships with each other, will be discussed. Economists are concerned with making the most efficient choices with scarce resources—our wants always exceed our means. We will see here how fiscal and monetary policies also impact our economic factors.

Goals of the Course:

The biggest goal of the course if for you to gain an understanding of how our economy works and how it impacts you and your future. I hope you understand the economic terms and the relationships between the economic factors to such a level that you view the news or current events in a new light.

Text:

The textbook for the course is Macroeconomics Sixth Ed. by Paul Krugman and Robin Wells.

Course Assignments, Schedule, and Grading Scheme:

Course material is organized into weekly modules. Weeks run Monday through the Sunday for most material. Work is due on Sunday at 11:59pm. Note that the final week ends on **Friday**!

Chapter Homework Problems and Learning Curve:

Upon completion of the LearningCurve activities (only one point each, more for the practice and familiarity of the concepts), the next graded task is to complete the chapter homework problems. Links will be in the weekly module.

Discussions:

We will have discussions through Packback every week. You are expected to create an initial discussion post by Thursday of each week. Your posts are to be researched, referenced, and substantive. Please aim for about two to three paragraphs of content. Pay close attention to the discussion instructions near the top—the topic changes each week. You are also expected to reply to at least two classmates by Sunday each week. Your responses should be about a paragraph in length aiming to further the conversation on the topics.

Exams:

There will be two exams in this course – one during the fourth week of the course and another during the eighth week of the course (Note that the final week ends on **FRIDAY** rather than Sunday). The first exam will cover weeks one through four content, while the second exam will cover weeks five through eight. Once accessed, each exam allows two hours for completion. YOU MUST COMPLETE THE EXAM IN ONE SITTING (you cannot save and pick-up where you left off later), so make sure to block off enough time to complete it.

Late Work:

Discussions cannot be accepted after the module closes as such a large part of the grade and goal is the interaction with your classmates. Late work may be accepted up to seven days after the due date on a case-by-case basis. Please make every effort to be in touch before the deadline. No work will be accepted after the course closes. Incompletes will also be discussed on a case-by-case basis, but in general will not be accepted unless at least 80% of the course material is completed.

Grading:

Your course grade will be based on 2 exams, 17 chapter homework assignments (one for each chapter), 8 weekly discussions, and 17 LearningCurve exercises.
