ECONOMICS 1015H: PRINCIPLES OF MACROECONOMICS (HONORS)

The course will develop your ability to analyze, interpret and explain the macroeconomy. This includes understanding macroeconomic data and building models to interpret that data. Important aims of the course include learning how to express the results of your analysis and interpretation of macroeconomic issues concisely both verbally and in written form. You will be expected to demonstrate an ability to analyze the economy using these written forms, as well as verbally during class discussions.

Econ 1015H provides much greater breadth and depth of coverage than the large Econ 1015 class; it is an ideal course for students who want a more challenging and rewarding introduction to economics.

Homework Assignments

There will be 12 homework assignments throughout the semester, with the lowest 2 dropped from your final grade. Assignments will be assigned on a Thursday and will cover that day and the following Tuesday's lectures. Homeworks will be due the following Thursday at the **beginning** of class and <u>must be submitted</u> <u>via Canvas</u>. All due dates are in canvas. Late assignments get no credit. Emailing an assignment to me on the rare occasion that you have a conflict or personal emergency is acceptable.

There will be periodic questions asked during lectures for the class via the iClicker system. iClicker questions will be graded by participation only, i.e. the correct answer isn't required to receive full credit.

Exams are closed book

Each exam consists of 110 possible points but is scored on a 100-point scale. Exams are administered in the classroom during the regular meeting time. Exams are closed book, and students may be asked to show a current student ID with a photo at each exam. There are no make-up exams, except possibly in the event of a medical or personal emergency. In case of an unavoidable emergency that affects your attendance on the day of an exam (e.g., military call-ups, severely debilitating or highly contagious illness (i.e. Covid-19, etc.), or a death in the immediate family), you will be excused from the exam if and only if you provide me with your justification via e-mail and submit proper documentation in a timely manner (e.g. military orders in advance, or a doctor's note/published obituary after the fact).

The final exam is **NOT** comprehensive.
